Guitar wall hanger

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intro: Guitar wall hanger

I was at the local Guitar Center today and noticed that they are charging 15.00 bucks for a wall mount to hang your guitar by... I figured it would take about 20 minutes and a few bucks but it would save me some cash, which i dont have right now.



step 1: Gather parts

The first step is to gather parts... The parts i used were:

Hollow Wall Anchors #6-32 X 2-3/8" SUPER Tool hanger Scrap Closet rod with a flat side.



step 2: Prep parts

In this step I cut the closet rod scrap to a length of 4" and drilled 3 holes. 2 on each end for the screws to go through, and 1 pre-hole for the Super Tool to screw into.



step 3: Assemble

Put everything together and hang it on the wall..

I never said this was hard..

You have to first mark where the wall anchors are going to be and then pound them into the wall and screw them all the way tight so that they're anchored to the wall. Then, when you screw it through the closet rod, the threads will catch.



step 4: Keep your guitars out of the reach of small children... And midgets... if you so choose.

Hang the gee tar on the wall and enjoy.

I made three of these for just over 8 bucks when Guitar Center was charging 15.00 each for them.

It would probably work as long as you put it into a wall stud... assuming you have wood wall studs and not metal.

It would also depend on the depth of the guitar body. Make sure that once the hook is screwed in, you'll still have enough room for the guitar to hang away from the wall. This will protect it from scratches and and temp or humidity changes in the wall.

I think every guitarist cringed when they read this. It really sounds like the screws would scratch the finish on the neck. My roommate suggests you put superglue or gorilla glue in a one by one foot square on the wall, and press the back of your guitar into this square.

You know, i think I actually found that in the trim section of home depot. It wasn't planed (by me) it's how i bought it.

Also, check the scrap bin because a lot of the time they have smaller chunks in there. I just saw some today. I'm not sure what people use it for.

I've made these with scrap wood of 2 pieces. The back was plywood (oval traced from a craftstore prefab piece) and a small diamond (or square) piece glued and screwed from behind to add thickness enough for the main screw. I do have one that's into a piece of 2x4, but there's always a chance of that splitting down the middle because of weight.

Definitely screw into a stud with long screws. The "sledge-hammer" holder hooks were available at Home Depot or Lowes, but now I can only find them at K-mart, since Sears bought them. They're like 50 cents or something like that in the tool section. I've also made uke holders with the smaller grey-rubber coated hooks that HD and Lowes carries. The hooks are even ok for wider necks like classicals and 12-strings, and you just turn them a little for strat-style heads.

You should look at the hook closely when buying to get one with the screw centered on the "u". There's some that are a little crooked or off-center, and others really bad.

The one for the uke (small grey hook) has the original pine-plaque for it's base, that I got from the craft store to use for tracing the oval. For the main ovals, I used 3/4" scrap pieces of sanded plywood to ensure strength and either plywood or 1x4 scrap for the square/diamond.

Make sure you screw into a stud with long enough screws! I used some decking screws.
